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HEAC Strategic Partners Start Work on Five-Year Plan

As noted in the August 2014 edition of *El Noticiero* (Vol. 38 No. 4.1 "Hispanic Education Advisory Council (HEAC) Develops a Five-Year Plan") the HEAc is developing a strategic plan to address the needs of the Hispanic students in the public district and charter schools of the state. The Hispanic Education Act (HEA) charges the NMPED and Higher Education Department to eliminate the education achievement gap between Hispanics and their Anglo peers in New Mexico. The plan will guide on-going work within both the Public Education and Higher Education Departments, to identify the most promising evidence-based practices and programs that will improve the success of New Mexico's Hispanic students and their families.

The strategic partners met on Sept. 12, 2014 in Santa Fe, NM. La Plática Bajo La Resolana: A Work Session for Strategic Partners of the Hispanic Education Act was facilitated by New Mexico First. The 90 participants represented a cross-section of stakeholders in Hispanic education from the public schools, universities, community groups and non-profit organizations. This meeting offered a unique opportunity for individuals and organizations to engage in discussion to improve educational success for Hispanic students.

Process

The participants focused on three strategic goals

1. Student Success:

Identify evidenced-based practice that can ensure educational success of Hispanic students by closing the achievement gap between them and their Anglo peers.

2. Family Engagement:

Identify evidenced-based practice to ensure the incorporation of the Hispanic families' cultures in school's curriculum, including the school/district's family engagement plan.

3. Collaboration:

Identify evidenced-based practice that increases collaboration between school, families, community and business, to improve educational opportunities for Hispanic students.

By focusing on the following two questions for each of the goals, the group was able to develop preliminary recommendations:

- What priorities do we need to implement in order to ensure we accomplish the student success goal?
- How can we monitor success? What data should we track to demonstrate progress?

Next steps

The outcomes of the HEAC work session will be shared with legislators at the Project Unidos Legislative Education Summit on Sept. 29, 2014. The preliminary

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Professional Development Planned for English Learner (EL) Crosswalk

The New Mexico Public Education Department (NMPED) is sponsoring professional development for principals and other observers on how to use the *El Crosswalk*. This professional development will be provided by Dual Language Education of New Mexico (DLeNM) and by the Center for the Education and Study of Diverse Populations (CESDP) at New Mexico Highlands University. The Crosswalk is designed for use with the NM TEACH observation tool, to observe instruction in any classroom that has English Learners/Culturally and Linguistically Diverse Students (EL/CLD).

Using the NM TEACH Elements and Domains as a base, the

tool is aligned with best practices for sheltering English content instruction. While the NM TEACH tool offers a descriptor for each of the five levels of teacher effectiveness, the EL Crosswalk offers "look-fors" -- evidence of universal practices that enhance learning for ELs -- that principals should find when observing teachers in classrooms with ELL and CLD students. Intentional use of these practices can safeguard equity and ensure access to the NM Common Core Standards for CLD and ELL students.

A teacher who skillfully shelters content instruction will intentionally utilize these practices and demonstrate a highly effective or exemplary level of performance.

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Continued From Page 1-HEAC recommendations will be refined and finalized in upcoming meetings in October. After that, there will be a HEAC Community Forum to present the Five-Year Plan Draft. On Nov. 15, 2014, the 2013-2014 HEA Report will be posted on the web. Finally, the Five-Year Plan will be presented to the Legislative Education Study Committee at its Nov. 17, 2014 meeting.

<u>Continued From Page 1-Crosswalk</u> Teachers who do not use any of these indicators would be classified as ineffective for such students.

The EL Crosswalk also supports the NM English Language Development Standards and data from ACCESS (Assessing Comprehension and Communication in English State-to-State), which is the current statewide assessment used to measure student progress in learning English. These standards (and student data related to the standards) help to inform instruction; they are now part of the teacher performance assessment process.

NMABE will feature effective practices that the Bilingual Multicultural Education Bureau has identified in districts and schools which have produced high academic outcomes for their English Learner populations. Unique practices found to be effective in each region of the state will be shared with teachers and administrators at the NMABE annual Bilingual Educators' Institute, held in conjunction with Bilingual Education Day at the Legislature. The Institute will also offer a major session on Literacy Squared® (http://literacysquared.org/?page_id=15) emphasizing practices that can accelerate the development

of biliteracy. While designed for Spanish- and English-speaking children, the model posits that literacy needs to be taught from the linguistic framework of each individual's language. As such, the framework's concepts should be useful for Native American Bilingual Education practitioners as well. Finally, the Institute will also focus on the new *EL Crosswalk*, designed to augment the NM TEACH evaluation tool, for use by any teacher working with English learners. The registration fee is \$150.00.
