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NHCC Hosts Fourth Annual Santillana, USA National Spanish Spelling Bee

The Fourth Annual Santillana, USA National Spanish Spelling Bee took place in Albuquerque, New Mexico from July 17th until the 19th at the National Hispanic Cultural Center (NHHC). Students from across the United States competed to see who would be crowned the national champion. Out of 23 contestants, spellers John Adamson, Eric Leal and Stephanie Arévalo helped round out the top five, while two-time champion Judith Villa and Andrés Arreola took the 2014 competition to the 28th round

before a winner was declared. After Villa received an "incorrecto" while spelling the word "PERENDENGUE," Arreola was able to spell that same word "correcto" and clinched the championship with the word "MAGUEYAL."

Even with Spanish being a mostly phonetic language,

students from the 4th to 8th grade are also challenged to spell the words complete with correct diacritical marks, such as accents, $tildes(\tilde{n})$ and the $di\acute{e}resis(..g\"{u}e)$. The students receive a list that is provided to them in the weeks and months prior to the competition, but to add to the excitement, there's a secret word list that is only unveiled once all of the words from the original

list have been used.

Along with being academic, the Santillana, USA National

Spanish Spelling Bee is also a family and cultural event, spanning three days of food, fun and stories. Students were joined by their parents, teachers and individual sponsors. Before the main event at

BMEB Selects Task Force for Bilingual Seal

Dr. Icela Pelayo, Director of the Bilingual Multicultural Education Bureau (BMEB) of the New Mexico Department of Education (NMPED), will select highly qualified members of the education community to serve on the STATE SEAL OF BILINGUALISM-BILITERACY Task Force. Meetings are scheduled for September 19, October 17 and November 14, 2014, from 8:30 a.m. to 2:30 p.m.

The Seal was created in legislation during the 2014 New Mexico Legislative Session, Rep. Rick Miera was its sponsor.

The State Seal of Bilingualism-Biliter-

acy Task Force determine specific criteria for awarding the Seal on the New Mexico Diploma of Excellence for graduates who are proficient in speaking and writing a language other than English. They will also consider criteria for awarding a seal as well for non-written Native languages. The Task Force will incorporate existing local district and school level Bilingualism-Biliteracy Seal guidance that supports the State Seal of Bilingualism-Biliteracy requirements.

Specifically, the Task Force will:

1) Draft a proposed rule to establish the

- specific criteria for students to earn the seal of Bilingualism-Biliteracy;
- Set a timeline for districts and state charter schools to begin implementing processes for awarding the Seal;
- Draft a State Seal of Bilingualism-Biliteracy handbook to support districts and state charter schools; and,
- Incorporate current, local-level seal designs to establish a State Seal of Bilingualism-Biliteracy.

The Task Force will be composed of language experts including:

New Mexico, which has a strong history of Bilingual Education, has won the event in all four years since the Bee began. Massachusetts and Oregon had

PRACTICES THAT WORK FOR ELS

Unique practices found to be effective in each region of the state will be shared with teachers and administrators at both the NMABE Northeast and Southwest Teacher Institutes, scheduled for the Fall of 2014. LITERACY SQUARED®

NMABE's annual Bilingual Educators' Institute is held in conjunction with its annual Bilingual Education Day at the Legislature. Dr. Kathy Escamilla, noted expert in Literacy Squared® (http://literacysquared.org/?page_id=15) will share practices designed to accelerate the development of biliteracy. While designed for Spanish- and English-speaking children, the model posits that literacy

needs to be taught from the linguistic framework of each individual's language. As such, the framework's concepts should be useful for Native American Bilingual Education practitioners as well. The institute will also focus on the new *EL Crosswalk*, which has been designed to augment the NM TEACH evaluation tool, for use by any teacher working with English learners. The registration fee is \$150.00.
