From the milking and calving of cows to ploughing fields and stacking the hay, there's not a dull moment on Ballachurry with the mischievous antics of the Boss and his workers!


Written by Captain of the Parish Stanley Clucas, this is a very personal book with photographs taken from both the Clucas family album and local Rushen farmers.

Looking back across the decades with our Tourism HAT

On Friday 27th May, the volunteers of our Tourism HAT launched our first exhibition of the year with "The Happy Days of Southern Tourism" at St Catherine's Church Hall in Port Erin.

Attracting over 1,000 visitors in just 19 days, the exhibition looked at the memories and stories of tourism in Rushen from swimming at the Traie Meanagh Baths to golf at the Rowany, dancing at Bradda Glen and Collinson's Café to tennis or bowls in Breagle Glen - showing just how much things have changed in the south since the late 1800s.



"The hey days of southern tourism may be a bygone era," says Minister the Hon Laurence Skelly MHK, who opened the exhibition at our launch party, "but tourism is such a valuable part of our local economy. When you see the glens that the Victorians give us and the history and heritage that surrounds us – tourism is still here and the volunteers of Rushen Heritage Trust are keeping these stories alive through exhibitions such as this one."

Historian Nigel Crowe on the trail of the 'richest historical record'

Exciting progress has been made by Nigel Crowe, a member of our Story of the Land Heritage Action Team.

Thanks to the help of Annie Nédallec, Honorary French consul in the Isle of Man, a photographic record dating from the 1950s has been secured. Created by the late Professor Pièrre Flatrès, latterly of the Sorbonne in Paris, the record features areas of historic landscape in the south of the island.

Professor Flatrès spent several weeks in the Isle of Man in 1951 working on Manx aspects of his doctoral studies. His 600 page thesis, which compared the historic geography of 'Four Celtic Countries', appeared in print in 1957.



Professor Pièrre Flatrès was born in Saint-Jean-Trolimon in 1921 and died in Paris in 1998. He was part of a Brittany School of Geography that helped to better understand the geography of Britain and other Celtic countries, devoting his thesis to the four Celtic countries of Ireland, Wales, Cornwall and the Isle of Man.

The possibility occurred to local historian, Nigel Crowe, that additional, unpublished Manx material might remain in the hands of the Professor's family and this proved to be true. Thanks to Annie and her husband, Michael Kneale, contact was made with Madame Flatrès, who has generously donated the material to MNH and has given permission to the Rushen Heritage Trust for its use in a forthcoming exhibition being organised by the HAT.

Nigel hopes to involve the team in rolling out the first phase of an Historical Landscape Character project, which will eventually cover the whole island.

"No-one else has seriously applied a similar analytical approach to the landscape since Flatrès' time," explains Nigel on the importance of the Professor's work. "This will provide a unique opportunity to see how his ideas contribute to the new approach which we are adopting".

Our Story of the Land team open their first exhibition "A Year on Ballachurry Farm" in July. Enjoy this special preview!

It's one of those balmy summer evenings and the Boss and the Missus are leaning on the house field gate, gazing over the crop of oats which lay before them like a sea of gold, whispering and rippling in the light evening breeze

Above them, young swallows from the first hatching are playing 'tag'. Ducking and diving in the late evening sun, building strength in their wings for the long journey south while their parents, busy with their second batch of young, are flying high and catching insects that rise above the corn.

Like the hay, the oats stand straight, undamaged by strong winds so it's easy to cut. Clovers and trefoils grow in abundance, making the crop rich in food value. A week after cutting, when the sap has dried out in the warm sunshine, every hand is called on to turn the swathe. With the pitchfork reversed, the handle slides under the heavy row and with just a flick of the wrist the swathe is neatly turned and the damp side exposed to the sun.



The men are all skilled in the use of the pitchfork and they build the loose hay into a ruck. When freshly built, the ruck can stand over seven feet high. It's then carefully raked down and the bottom tucked underneath to make it neat and waterproof. Like all work in the fields it will be compared and discussed in fine detail at the Station Hotel on Saturday night!

Interned ...but not forgotten.

Internment must have been a traumatic experience for the majority of the women detained. Most returned after the war to a 'normal' way of life, but there were many highly educated individuals amongst them and a number went on to have quite interesting careers. Here are two such women...



Minna Specht taught at a number of progressive boarding schools in Germany. In 1933, she fled the country with pupils from her school when she refused to conform to Hitler's principles of a military education. Whilst interned in Rushen, she set up schools in Port St Mary for kindergarten and up to 16 years old, and classes for adults.

After the war, she worked in London and with UNESCO to help young people brought up with Nazism, whose lives had been shattered by the war.

Marie Reidermeister studied Mathematics and Physics. In 1925, she went to work in Vienna with Otto Neurath as a designer before they left for The Hague in 1934.

When Germany invaded Holland in 1940, they escaped to England and were both interned on the Island. Marie contributed to the education of the internee's children as a teacher.



After their release they married and, after Otto's death in 1945, Marie translated and edited his documentation of methods of designing and disseminating data, which has played a major role in 20th century graphic design.

She also went on to write several history books for children, which became a mainstay of class libraries across the UK in the 1970s.

Special memories of our Internment HAT volunteers

Sisters Ali Graham and Jane Saywell have become specialists in Rushen internment since joining Rushen Heritage Trust and passionate about preserving the memories of the women who were interned as well as the local landladies who shared their lives with them. Here they remember their grandmother, who was one of them.



Our grandmother Mary Eslick (nee Brew) ran a boarding house on the Promenade in Port St. Mary during the time of the Women's Internment Camp. Southlands was a large double fronted house (now Aaron House) and in May 1940, over 20 internees were billeted with her and her five children.

Our grandfather had succumbed to his injuries from the First World War in October 1934 and she was finding it very hard to manage on her own, as visitor numbers had dropped significantly. When she heard the news that they were to house the internees and receive a guinea a week for each adult, her words were "it saved our bacon!".

During the first year, many of the internees were released back to the UK and so in May 1941, Port St. Mary Promenade was used as a 'mixed camp' and Mary received a number of married internees.

Dr. Gerhard Bersu and his wife Maria were billeted in Southlands and became good friends with Mary. They were renowned archaeologists and Dr. Bersu uncovered the Viking Long ship buried at Balladoole. They remained on the Island after the internment camps were closed to finish their archaeological work.

Mary moved to Manchester House in Port St. Mary High Street (now a chemist's shop) which she continued to run as a boarding house. She also opened an antique shop on the ground floor.



Mary (May) was a well known and well respected member of the Port St. Mary community and wherever possible, she would always help anyone in need, even when she had so little herself - but then they were a 'bulldog breed'.

Richard Wagner's great-granddaughter joins Rushen Heritage Trust in our unique festival at the EAC this summer!

Led by our WW2 Internment HAT, the festival will celebrate the life of Richard Wagner's "rebellious" granddaughter Friedelind (1918-1990), who was interned in Port Erin in 1940. She was the only member of the Wagner family to be strongly anti-Nazi and her mother was a close friend of Hitler. Richard Wagner's greatgranddaughter, Dagny Beidler who will be joining Professor Eva Rieger at the festival, met Friedelind in 1964 and they became very close friends.



Rieger was born on 21st November 1940 in Port Erin and christened in what is now the Erin Arts Centre.

She lived with her parents, the German pastor Julius Rieger and the librarian Johanna Rieger, in London and moved to Berlin in 1953. There, Eva studied music education, musicology and English and in 1976, wrote her doctorate with a thesis on Music Education in the GDR. Between 1978 and 1991 she was Academic Councillor at the Universities of Göttingen and Hildesheim; from 1991 Professor of Historical Musicology at the University of Bremen and then from 1988 to 1992, a Board member of the journal "Feminist Studies".

Eva gave lectures worldwide from the US and Canada to Japan and Europe. In 1996, she co-founded "Gender Studies" in the German Society for Music Research and in 2000 assisted in the creation of the "Mariann Steegmann Institute of Art & Gender" at the University of Bremen and the "Research Center for Music and Gender" at the University of Music, Drama and Media in Hanover.

In 2009, she was a corresponding member of the American Musicological Society and the first person to create a musicological study on discrimination against women in the German musical culture. Her main study focused on the life and work of Richard Wagner and she wrote her acclaimed book about his granddaughter Friedelind Wagner in 2012.



Isle of Man Walks is still on track for launch this autumn!

We have a special team of over 70 volunteers lined up to field test the app over the summer ready for our launch on October 1st, with an expanded version of the app that will feature walks across both Port St Mary and Port Erin too.
