The countdown begins...

On Saturday 30th April 2016, RHT will make history when we launch **Isle of Man Walks** - the island's first interactive outdoor heritage walk using iBeacon technology and possibly the first of its kind in the whole world!



Led by our **Story of the Land** HAT, the app will bring to life the outdoor walking trails of the Isle of Man, preserving the rich heritage of the communities on the island by sharing the memories of people, places and past events.

Working in partnership with **Fuzzelogic Solutions** in Douglas, the project will be initiated by the development of a pilot trail of 15 stations from Port St Mary to the Sound. An interactive beacon will be attached to each station and will broadcast signals, activating the app on your mobile phone with images, film and audio about the heritage of the landscape you are walking through.

Our Vision is to become internationally recognised as an interactive walk, supported by local organisations to share cultural and heritage information with residents and tourists, generating significant economic benefit for the Isle of Man.



"The new app perfectly highlights the ethos of Rushen Heritage Trust promoting virtual museum and local history together," says Rushen MHK and Board Director Laurence Skelly. "I expect both visitors and local residents alike will enjoy this new tool to appreciate our deep and rich heritage."

Join us from 10am on Saturday 30th April 2016 at the Sound Café, where we will be launching the app with demonstrations and you can meet the Heritage Action Team and developers who have built this wonderful piece of new technology for our community to share.

A Year in the Life of Ballachurry Farm

RHT are set to publish three books in 2016 and "A Year in the Life of Ballachurry Farm: 1943-1944" written by Stanley Clucas is one of them. We hope that you will enjoy this short preview!

The weather comes in like a lion; windy and cold but fortunately dry. There is a real flurry of activity on all of the farms in the Parish as the dry spell allows the field work to press ahead. The yards have been emptied of the middens' and the ley and stubble fields have been ploughed; the work is well in hand. At Ballachurry Farm, the tractor that was purchased last year has been a boon! The Boss, wrapped up in his army coat and his pipe near smoking as much as the machine he's sat upon, is ploughing furrows straight and true that gives him a satisfaction that only a countryman would understand.



This steed he rides needs only water and paraffin to get through the day and can work into the late evening without tiring. The only care needed after a day's work is to close the shed door and go for tea. Many of his fellow farmers agree that it's the start of the end of the proud Clydesdales and the men who have worked the land for past generations. The early and main crop potatoes are in the ground and the spring wheat sown, so they can relax a little and tend to the other essentials. More of the fat stock are reaching maturity and need preparing for market while the younger stock, sensing the longer days approaching, are restless to get out to new grass.
