Truth and Baloney DetectorTM

Truth fits God's Big Picture (that is, the Biblical Worldview). Baloney doesn't fit God's Big Picture!

Sometimes we hear (or read) a little Truth mixed with a lot of baloney. Sometimes we hear (or read) a lot of Truth mixed with a little baloney. Sometimes it's all baloney with no Truth. Occasionally it's all Truth with no baloney. Recognizing the difference is called discernment. Use this Truth and Baloney Detector to determine which elements of a song, story, speech, film, or book fit God's Big Picture (the Biblical Worldview) and which elements do not fit. Think about this in relation to the worldview components of God, Creation, Humanity, Moral Order and Purpose, as outlined below.

God:

It is true that plants and animals are beautiful, valuable

Baloney

We have an amazing ability to manage plants, animals and the things of the material world, such as clay. It is a privilege and a responsibility to manage these things well.

Moral Order (right/wrong, good/evil):

It is good, proper and right for people to give thanks.

People should not be wasteful or harmful to the environment, but take care of it. This is part of the role that God gave humans when He first created us: to govern over, or, "steward" all the earth.

Humanity:

This program implies that people ought to take directives from "Nature," and that humans are subject to "Nature." This contradicts God's First Commission to humans, to rule over His creation.

This program teaches that we should serve "Mother Earth" instead of Father God.

Moral Order:

This TV program condones thanking "Mother Earth." It implies that what is good for "Nature" is right for human beings. This elevates "Nature" above God *and* humans!

Moral order, here, seems to be "Earth first, humans second, and never mind the God of the Bible."

In this program, there is no higher law than "love Nature." Again, this is idolatry.

Purpose (meaning, intention, destiny, etc.):

Caring for plants and animals provides a great purpose for human beings.

Purpose:

In this TV program, there is a "calling" to "save the Earth," and to serve Nature. This is a purpose that is totally Earthcentered, with no mention of accountability to the God of the Bible, or serving Him through the way we manage plants, animals and clay, etc.
