Labs and Lectures

Practical Ultrasound:

Case Discussions for the Beginner

Robert O'Brien, DVM, MS, DACVR

Thursday, Sept. 14, 8 am - 4 pm

The morning lecture will take you through a series of cases that will introduce diseases of each abdominal organ and their sonographic characteristics. We will stress the thought process with sonographic identification of lesions in the context of the clinical signs and bloodwork of the patient. We will stress common and surgical lesions in each of the organs. The afternoon lab will stress a practical approach towards imaging the "Big 6" organs in the abdomen: liver, gall bladder, spleen, kidneys, and urinary bladder. **\$595 (\$645 after 8/27); 7 CEU, Max 20 attendees. Canine Rehabilitation 101:

Improving Outcomes with Easy Tools and Tricks

Thursday, September 14

Session 1: 9 am - 12 pm, or Session 2: 1-4 pm

In this lecture, we will cover the basic principles of canine rehabilitation including tissue injury and healing, patient assessment, gait analysis, pain management and assistive devices. Therapeutic modalities including ultrasound, laser, PEMF, shock wave and electrical stimulation will be discussed. We will cover basics of therapeutic exercise, how to measure outcomes and specific rehabilitation plans for various common conditions including post operative rehabilitation for orthopedic cases, geriatric, neurologic and feline rehabilitation. In the lab, using volunteer dogs, we will demonstrate functional assessments of patients, range of motion exercises, stretching and review how to perform specific exercises for forelimb, hind limb, core and proprioception as well as creating home exercise programs for patients. **\$210 (\$235 after 8/27) 3 CEU, Max 16 per session.**

Ophthalmic Procedures for the General Practitioner

Session 1: 9 am - 12 pm, or Session 2: 1-4 pm

This wet-lab includes enucleation, lid laceration repair, temporary tarsorrhaphy, and corneal grid. Isolated pig eyes with lids will be used for all of the procedures except for enucleation, which will be taught with canine cadaver heads. The lab size is limited to 12 participants, each participant will have two isolated pig eyes for practice. The canine cadaver heads will be shared between two participants. Step by step hands on instruction will be provided for each procedure. The goal for this wet lab is to familiarize the attendees with specific tissue handling techniques, surgical techniques and to have an increased comfort level for tackling some/all of the discussed procedures in emergency practice. **\$475 (\$500 after 8/27) 3 CEU, Max 12 per session.**



Essential Wound Management & Reconstructive Surgery Techniques for Small Animal Practice

Ray Kudej, DVM, PhD, DACVS

Thursday, September 14, 8 am - 12 pm

Participants will learn and practice with the most useful wound management and skin closure techniques, and expand their ability to design effective wound care/closure plans. Wound debridement, moisture-retentive dressings, honey, "tie-over bandages" and more will be addressed. Additionally, how to close oddly shaped defects and defects in challenging places, plan cutaneous and subcutaneous mass removal, eliminate dog-ears, perform subdermal plexus flaps (H-, V-to-Y- and Z-plasties, skin fold flaps and more) and caudal superficial axial pattern flaps, use closed suction drains and wound diffusion catheters, relieve tension with skin stretching, and critical suturing techniques for incisions under tension. Participants will be challenged to appropriately select and perform the techniques to lesions from real-life clinical cases simulated on cadavers. **\$495 (\$520 after 8/27) 4 CEU, Max 14. 2-hours lecture/2-hours hands-on cadaver lab**

Common Surgical Procedures and Mistakes

Thursday, September 14, 1 - 4 pm

In this outstanding two-hour Lecture/two-hour Hands-on Cadaver Lab, participants will learn and practice a variety of soft tissue surgery procedures used every day in small animal practice. Emphasis will be placed on the technical aspects used throughout each step of the procedure. Topics chosen represent surgical conditions commonly seen in veterinary practice and include salivary gland resection, common lymph node excisions, laryngeal tie-back, scrotal urethrostomy, incisional gastropexy, toe amputation, and anal sacculectomy. Following the lecture, participants will perform the procedures themselves on a cadaver under the guidance of a highly skilled surgeon. This lab is designed for veterinarians interested in providing a higher level of surgical treatment for a variety of practical soft tissue surgery techniques in their practice. **\$495 (\$520 after 8/27) 4 CEU, Max 14.**

What Does BEEP Mean to You? Blood pressure, ECG, End-tidal CO₂, and Pulse Oximetry

Session 1: 9 am - 12 pm, or Session 2: 1-4 pm

In this dry lab, Technicians will rotate in small group format through two stations: ETCO₂ and Blood Pressure, and SpO₂ and ECG. Each station will take 90 minutes and will cover detailed information on these monitoring parameters, with troubleshooting algorithms and case examples included. When do I treat an arrhythmia? How low can my patient's blood pressure go? Why monitor ETCO₂? What does pulse oximetry really tell me? These are just a few of the questions that will be answered in this interactive lab. **\$150 (\$175 after 8/27) 3 CEU, Max 16 per session.**

Ultrasound - The Foundation: Scanning Techniques & Introductory Abdominal Ultrasound

This is the ideal course to begin your ultrasound training. You'll be exposed to ultrasound physics and system instrumentation. You'll learn the fundamentals of image acquisition and scanning techniques. The afternoon session will focus on the "big" organs: liver, spleen, urinary bladder, kidneys, and GI tract.

Course Objectives: Learn the principles governing image generation; What, when, and why of equipment controls; Learn basic motor skills and probe control using ultrasound scanning phantoms; Recognition of normal organ structure; Hands-on scanning of live animals for the "Big 5" (liver, spleen, kidneys, and bladder). Thinking about building a new hospital or renovating your existing practice? This discussion will examine the process step by step, starting with role of the architect, why you need one and how to choose one: qualifications, licenses, questions to ask, and fees to expect. We will discuss the timelines of design and documentation, as well as construction. All aspects of the hospital need to be considered, the public spaces including the lobby/waiting areas and exam rooms, as well as the working spaces, such as Pharmacy, Treatment, Laboratory, Surgery, X-ray, Dentistry, Ultrasound, Patient Wards and support spaces. We will discuss options for building materials for flooring and counters/cabinets, taking into consideration veterinary-specific needs. Building systems will be reviewed, including Mechanical (Heating/ Cooling ventilation, plumbing), Electrical, and O2 and Scavenger. And finally, don't forget about a plan for parking and your grounds. There will be time at the end for questions about your plans or draft designs. **No charge to attend.**
