



Anatomy of a Church

During my service in Italy as a church planter and pastor there was one book that really changed my life. Actually, it was more like a study guide from a series about the church by Pastor John MacArthur of Grace Church in Panorama City in California. It was called "The Anatomy of a church". At the time I was very interested in the subject of church growth and studied great movements of God around the world. Looking at Mega Churches I wondered what were the factors that made them grow? Listening to tapes of "The Anatomy of the Church" I realized, "This is what it is all about." By looking at present church growth theories, Pastor McArthur explained that all we had to do is to go back to the basics. So what are the basics?



The church was described by illustrations of the human body. (I Corinthians 12:12-27. Romans 12:4, 5). The body's skeleton keeps everything together and upright. The various organs inside the body are supplied by the internal blood system, while the muscles move various parts of the body. The skin (flesh) covers and protects the body,

which is controlled by the brain inside the head.

Let us start with the skeleton. There are certain fundamentals to which a church must be committed.

The ones holding the church together are:

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- A high view of God. Our goal is to glorify God and enjoy Him forever. (I Corinthians 10:31). We glorify Him by putting him first and exalting Him. "I have always placed the Lord before me." (Psalm 16:8) Our view of God affects our entire spiritual life. How big and great and awesome is our Lord?
- 2. A firm belief in the inspiration of scripture. (2 Timothy 3:16). Our God is a perfect God and He has given us a perfect Word which He inspired using various authors from different times and locations. The Word is trustworthy and practical. We should accept the Bible for what it is and seek to diligently understand its message and apply it to our lives.
- 3. **Doctrinal clarity.** God has given us His Word, which teaches all we need to know for our faith and practise. Sound doctrine should lead to a sound life. The Bible teaches us the existence and attributes of our mighty God. It describes the Trinity comprised of the Father, the Son and the Holy Spirit. It speaks of the creation of man and his fall. It

teaches us about Jesus Christ who lived, ministered, and died on the cross for our sins. It declares the free gift of salvation through our Lord Jesus Christ. It pictures the blessed work of the Holy Spirit in illuminating the Scriptures, convicting us of sin, righteousness, and judgement, and guiding our lives. Through the Scriptures we also learn about angels and the end times.

 Our personal holiness. We must obey what the Bible teaches. We are to be holy as the Lord is holy. Robert Murray McCheyne said, "It is not great tal"It is not great talents that God blesses so much as likeness to Christ." Robert Murray McCheyne

ents that God blesses so much as likeness to Christ." He also stated "The Greatest need of my congregation is my personal holiness."

5. **Spiritual authority in the church.** Whether pastors or elders, leaders must be men of integrity and wisdom as they direct the affairs of the church. They are to be examples (I Tim. 4:16). Henry Martyn, the great missionary to Burma said that the primary responsibility of a man of God was not to evangelize but to sanctify his own soul.

Like the blood, our spiritual attitudes are the living systems in the body. We can know the truth, have great talents, but without proper attitudes we are nothing. Paul sums up the proper spiritual attitudes which we should pos-

The fruit of the spirit is: "love, joy, peace, patience, faithfulness, gentleness, against such things there is no law." We now come to the muscles. These are the functions of the church, what the church does – worshipping God and praying. Preaching and teaching are functions which believers do as they flex their muscles. We can also include training and discipleship. Of course, these activities should be motivated by

love and pure motivation (our spiritual attitudes).

The skin (flesh) is what people see. We 'flesh out' all of these principles and apply them to our lives.

Of course, in all things Christ is to be the Head (Matthew 16:18, I Corinthians 12). He leads, sustains, provides and protects. At the end of the book of Hebrews is a great prayer: "May the God of peace, who through the blood of the eternal covenant brought back form the dead our Lord Jesus, that great Shepherd of the sheep, equip you with everything good for doing his will, and may he work in us what is pleasing to him, through Jesus Christ, to whom be glory for ever and ever. Amen." (Hebrews 13:20-21).


As part of my research for a church growth project, I asked John McArthur how I could apply his message to our church.

He wrote back these simple but profound thoughts: "First of all, take the

principles from the Anatomy of the Church and apply them to your own personal life. Then pour your life into the lives of other people in the church."

May God help us, both as individuals and as a church, to make these principles an integral part of our lives.




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SPECIAL OCCASIONS IN DECEMBER 2013

SNOW IN JERUSALEM

The early winter was one of the driest on record, so Israel's chief rabbi asked Jews worldwide to insert additional prayers for rain and recite special psalms. And behold, soon after meteorological data indicated that rain was headed to Israel. "You can stop praying for rain now!" the rabbis urged when the country was gripped by rain, wind and snowstorms. Instead, people were told to insert a prayer of thanksgiving. Friday, December 13, Jeru-

salemites awoke to a city covered in white. The thick layers of heavy snow shut down the capital and thousands of motorists were stranded. Public transportation was barely functioning, and only a handful of people were able to make it to Church that Sunday, December 15. The 20 that did come enjoyed a special service in the lounge.



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

Bethlehem Christmas Eve Outreach

Around 40 people from different nationalities assembled at JBC, welcomed by Bruce



with hot and cold drinks and cookies.





JBC around 1 p.m. and during the short ride Pastor AI began rehearsing the Christmas songs. Passing through the newly opened check-point the driver expertly maneuvered the bus through the small, steep and narrow streets of Bethlehem.

At the Russian Orthodox Pilgrim Palace Hotel the group wisely dressed in warm clothes. Despite the sun it was chilly outside. On their way to the main square, Pastor Al pointed out the tourist attractions. The "Milk Grotto" commemorated the place Mary fed baby Jesus. There were many olive wood factories, and from the roof of one of these shops you had a beautiful view of the area. Manger Square had been prepared for the festivities, while the souvenir and coffee shops were eagerly waiting the influx of pilgrims to celebrate the birth of Jesus.

The JBC group had until 4.30 p.m. Some went sightseeing through the town.

When the call to Muslim prayers died down, some of the group began to sing Christmas carols with Pastor Al. Curious bystanders were offered Arabic tracts and New Testaments.



Part of Manger Square was taken over by trucks from four major International TV networks who were to broadcast the celebrations live. Together with a few other organizations, JBC had been invited as a church by the Bethlehem municipality. Around 5 p.m. it was JBC's turn to enter the Peace Center for rehearsals.

Like every year, the program was changed. JBC would be on stage much later than scheduled, which messed up Bruce's carefully planned dinner at the hotel. While waiting in the freezing cold building the group was filmed by a TV crew.

Next to the stage they had to wait some more, but had a good view of the Austrian dance group that performed a musical about the birth of Jesus. Tired and cold from the long wait, the JBC group was relieved when their turn finally came around 7.30 p.m. The guitar was out of tune and the care-



fully prepared program had to be shortened and adjusted. Pastor Al was able to package the Gospel in between the songs he announced. And there they were: a bunch of people from all parts of the world, dressed in a colourful assembly of trainingsuits, winter coats, hats and gloves. Other groups were dressed in similar outfits or well-cut uniforms. For months they had been practicing for this evening. Our group sang the Christmas songs with conviction and from their hearts. And the people in the audience responded. Like every other year, the people enjoyed listening to the beautiful words of the Gospel of Life.

Eleanor, from our congregation, noticed a Muslim woman standing near the platform. She felt led to give her an Arabic tract, which the woman handed to her son who began to read it. When Eleanor also gave her an Arabic New Testament, the Muslim woman immediately began to read. The two women hugged and then the Muslim kissed the little NT. It was a God-moment. Eleanor said such moments are the reason why she loves to join the Bethlehem Christmas Outreach.



The friendly and patient hotel manager had a wonderful dinner waiting for the cold, tired and hungry group. Bruce had organized everything "as if he was pre-

paring a wedding banquet for his daughter," the manager told the group. "He even arranged for everyone to have ice cream for dessert."

He thanked Bruce for being his first American friend.

A hilarious time of taking the traditional group picture followed because so many people had given their cameras to the Nucciarone's cousin who kept saying, "Smile!"

According to the program, the bus was supposed to be back at JBC around 8 p.m. Due to the change in schedule, it was obvious everyone would be back in town much later than that.

The bus driver met quite a few other challenges when he tried to leave the (not so little) town of Bethlehem, but managed to reach the check point safely.

"Let's sing 'We wish you a merry Christmas'," Pastor Al suggested when it became clear they might have to wait for inspection. Rolling down



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the window, everyone began to sing at the top of their voices. Hearing the 'joyful noise' from the bus, the Israeli soldiers waved them through. It was warm and cozy in the bus. On the way to JBC the bus made several stops to drop off people.

For those who joined the Outreach, it had been a blessed adventure. And for those of you who missed out – Lord willing, on Christmas Eve 2014 we'll have another Bethlehem outreach. You are welcome to join us! (And bring your friends.)

NEWS FROM OUR JBC FAMILY ABROAD

EMILY NUCCIARONE - New Delhi, India

Emily was able to join her parents and sister in Jerusalem for the Christmas Holiday, and it was great seeing her in church.

In June this year she graduated from Bethlehem University with highest honors with a Masters in International Cooperation and Development. She did her thesis on Women and Mobility in



the West Bank and interviewed many people. While befriending Arab women she was able to testify about the way to freedom in Christ. In 2012, when applying for a job as a fellow with a relief organization she found out that 600 people applied for 21 positions. Emily received one of those positions in April 2013 and was also given her first choice of country to serve: India.

In New Delhi since September, she found a church, and is happy to be in that vast country. However, living and working there is not easy. Emily is sometimes sent on special missions to disaster areas. Flown first by plane, and then brought on the back of a motor bike, she then has to meet with people affected by e.g. a cyclone. By doing field surveys, taking pictures and analyzing the situation of the local population living in the affected areas, she then has to report back to the headquarters in Delhi.

Much of her work is in villages quite a distance from Delhi and conditions are often less than desirable. Because of the unhygienic situations in the villages, Emily prefers to stay overnight in convents. But even so a 'clean' toilet may have 20 cockroaches on the wall.

Please, pray for Emily's safety while travelling, and also for her health – she suffers from stomach problems and has lost a lot of weight.



Last year around Christmas, the Dannecker's were busy packing their suitcases to return to the US, not knowing what the new year would bring. In December 2013, 1 New Heart was able to purchase a home/office in Mount Joy, PA, USA. This base enables the family to do what they love: stay in missions, on a small salary, while keeping the overhead low. Helped by others, Hank does what he can to remodel the 40+ year old house. They hope to move in this spring. Michele continues to home-school the children who are growing and doing great. In February, Hank plans to visit Israel in order to look into ways to sponsor 2-3 children.

Remembering what He's done in the past, seeing and rejoicing at what the Lord is doing in the present, Hank, Michele and their family trust Him for the future.

CALENDAR 2014

According to the website of the Israeli Ministry of Foreign Affairs, Christianity is practiced by more than 150,000 Israeli citizens. Some 127,000 (80% of Christian residents) of Israel are Arab Christians, some 25,000 - the majority of the remaining are immigrants from the former Soviet Union who immigrated with Jewish relatives due to mixed marriages; there are also smaller ethno religious affiliations of about 7,000 Maronites, 1,000 Assyrians and 1,000 Copts.

President Shimon Peres spoke at the Franciscan Church in Ramla "It is a special occasion for us to be able to celebrate Christmas all together – we all pray to the same Lord and we all pray for the same thing – that the Lord may grant peace to us and our children, free from hatred and animosity. I came to offer my greetings on behalf of the State of Israel where Jews, Christians and Muslims live together. It is my pleasure to bring you the greetings of the whole people of Israel; a holiday for one religion is a holiday for the whole country. As a state we are responsible for your safety, freedom and holy sites and for your feeling as free and equal citizens that carry with them the hope that unites us for peace and a better world. The Lord is doing what he can but we must do what we need to do, to follow His wish and our destiny, to live in peace."

January 16, 2014 *TU B'SHVAT* - THE NEW YEAR OF TREES

"As others have planted for you, so you will plant for your children." Leviticus Rabbah, 28

Tu B'shvat, the 15th of the Hebrew month of *Shvat* (end of January, beginning of February) is not mentioned in the Bible. However, the *Mishnah** (part of the *Talmud*), describes it as the "New Year for trees". Around this date, Israel's rainy season is usually over, but people still hope for the blessing of the "latter rain". This holiday marks the revival of nature, which is symbolized by the budding of the almond tree.

Leviticus 19 tells us what was expected from the Israelites when they entered the Promised Land:

"When you come to the land and you plant a tree, you shall treat its fruit as forbidden; for 3 years it will be forbidden and not eaten. In the fourth year, all of its fruit shall be sanctified to praise the Lord. In the 5th year you may eat its fruit." (NIV)

Having a specific date as the New Year for trees also helped with the law of tithing $- 1/10^{\text{th}}$ of the farmer's fruit had to be donated to the priests.

Biblical tithes were:

- Orlah refers to a biblical prohibition (Leviticus 19:23) on eating the fruit of trees produced during the first three years after they are planted.
- Neta Reva'i refers to the biblical commandment (Leviticus 19:24) to bring fourth-year fruit crops to Jerusalem as a tithe.
- *Ma'aser Sheni* was a tithe which was eaten in Jerusalem.
- Ma'aser Ani was a tithe given to the poor (Deuteronomy 14:22-29) that was also calculated by whether the fruit ripened before or after Tu B'shvat.

During the Second Temple period it was customary to plant a tree when a child was born - a cedar for a boy (referring to its height and strength), and a cypress (smaller and fragrant) for a girl. When the child married, the wood of the tree was used to make the *chuppah**, the wedding canopy.

Throughout the ages, the diverse Jewish communities in the Diaspora developed all kinds of customs to celebrate this day. In the beginning of the 19th century, when the first Jewish settlers began to redeem *Eretz Israel*, part of their work was to plant trees on the barren and eroded hills.

On *Tu B'shvat*, January 25, 1890, Rabbi Zeev Yavetz and his students set a good example by planting trees in the agricultural colony of Zichron Ya'akov.

The idea to plant trees on *Tu B'shvat*, was in 1908 adopted by the Jewish Teachers Union and later by the Jewish National Fund (*Keren haKayemet lelsrael*), who, amongst other endeavours, began to oversee the forestation of the Land of Israel.

Many of Israel's major institutions have chosen this day for their inauguration ceremonies.

The cornerstone of the Hebrew University of Jerusalem was placed on Tu *B'shvat* 1918, and the first stone of Haifa's Technion was laid on the same day in 1925. The first Jewish parliament of the Jewish sovereign State chose to hold its first Knesset session on Tu *B'shvat*


1949.

On *Tu b'Shvat* it is customary to eat the types of dried fruit mentioned in Deuteronomy 8:8 (the Seven Species). Some Orthodox Jews make candy from their *Etrog* (one of "Four Species" during *Sukkot*) and eat it during *Tu B'Shvat*.



Tu B'shvat is sometimes called the Jewish Ar-

bour day. The highlight of the holiday is planting a new sapling in the soil of *Eretz Israel*, the Jewish homeland.


During the cold rains prior to the snow, over 200 people died of influenza.

When the snows came, the bodies were frozen until such time that they could be buried.


There are still tremendous needs for mattresses, warm blankets, warm clothes and food items. Please pray how God might use you to meet some of these needs.

POCKET DICTIONARY OF CHURCH HISTORY







Gold, Fur and Common Sense

(This story circulated by e-mail)

My husband and I had been happily married (most of the time) for five years but hadn't been blessed with a baby. I decided to do some serious praying and promised God that

if he would give us a child, I would be a perfect mother, love it with all my heart and raise it with His word as my guide. God answered my prayers and blessed us with a son. The next year God blessed us with another son. The following year, He blessed us with yet another son.

The year after that we were blessed with a daughter. My husband thought we'd been blessed right into poverty. We now had four children, and the oldest was only four years old.

I learned never to ask God for anything unless I meant it. As a minister once told me, "If you pray for rain, make sure you carry an umbrella." I began reading a few verses of the Bible to the children each day as they lay in their cribs. I was off to a good start.

God had entrusted me with four children and I didn't want to disappoint Him. I tried to be patient the day the children smashed two dozen eggs on the kitchen floor searching for baby chicks. I tried to be understanding when they started a hotel for homeless frogs in the spare bedroom, although it took me nearly two hours to catch all twenty-three frogs. When my daughter poured ketchup all over herself and rolled up in a blanket to see how it felt to be a hot dog, I tried to see the humor rather than the mess. In spite of changing over twenty-five thousand diapers, never eating a hot meal and never sleeping for more than thirty minutes at a time, I still thank God daily for my children.

While I couldn't keep my promise to be a perfect mother - I didn't even come close—I did keep my promise to raise them in the Word of God. I knew I was missing the mark just a little when I told my daughter we were going to church to worship God, and she wanted to bring a bar of soap along to "wash up" Jesus, too.

Something was lost in the translation when I explained that God gave us everlasting life, and my son thought it was generous of God to give us his "last wife."



My proudest moment came during the children's Christmas pageant. My daughter was playing Mary, two of my sons were shepherds and my youngest son was a wise man. This was their moment to shine. My five-year -old shepherd had practiced his line, "We found the babe wrapped in swaddling clothes." But he was nervous and said, "The baby was wrapped in wrinkled clothes."
